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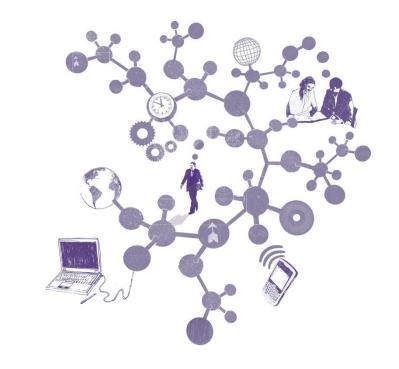

Audit Findings for Devon Pension Fund for the year ending 31 March 2015

This Audit Findings report highlights the significant findings arising from the audit for the benefit of those charged with governance (in the case of Devon Pension Fund, the Audit Committee), as required by International Standard on Auditing (UK & Ireland) 260. Its contents will be discussed with the Audit Committee.

As auditors we are responsible for performing the audit, in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK & Ireland), which is directed towards forming and expressing an opinion on the financial statements that have been prepared by management with the oversight of those charged with governance. The audit of the financial statements does not relieve management or those charged with governance of their responsibilities for the preparation of the financial statements.

The contents of this report relate only to those matters which came to our attention during the conduct of our normal audit procedures which are designed primarily for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements. Our audit is not designed to test all internal controls or identify all areas of control weakness. However, where, as part of our testing, we identify any control weaknesses, we will report these to you. In consequence, our work cannot be relied upon to disclose defalcations or other irregularities, or to include all possible improvements in internal control that a more extensive special examination might identify. We do not accept any responsibility for any loss occasioned to any third party acting, or refraining from acting on the basis of the content of this report, as this report was not prepared for, nor intended for, any other purpose.

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Section 1: Executive summary

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Executive summary

Purpose of this report

This report highlights the key matters arising from our audit of Devon Pension Fund's (the Fund) financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2015. It is also used to report our audit findings to management and those charged with governance in accordance with the requirements of International Standard on Auditing 260 (ISA UK&I).

Under the Audit Commission's Code of Audit Practice we are required to report whether, in our opinion, the Fund's financial statements present a true and fair view of the financial position and expenditure and income for the year and whether they have been properly prepared in accordance with the CIPFA Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting.

Introduction

We have made one change to our Audit Plan as previously communicated to you. This involved the re-classification of risk to the valuation of level 3 investments to a significant risk.

We received draft financial statements and accompanying working papers at the start of our audit, in accordance with the agreed timetable.

Our audit is substantially complete although we are finalising our work in the following areas:

- review of the final version of the financial statements
- obtaining and reviewing the final management letter of representation
- updating our post balance sheet events review, to the date of signing the opinion
- · review of the Pension Fund annual report, and
- final senior management and quality reviews.

We cannot formally conclude the audit and issue an audit certificate until we have completed our review of the Pension Fund Annual Report. We will review the Annual Report on completion and then issue our report and certificate of completion or separate audit statement on the pension fund annual report together with our audit certificate.

Key issues arising from our audit

Financial statements opinion

We anticipate providing an unqualified opinion in respect of the Fund's financial statements.

The key messages arising from our audit of the Fund's financial statements are:

- the draft financial statements and the supporting working papers were prepared to a high standard.
- no significant issues have been identified and only some minor presentation and disclosure amendments have been made as a result of our audit

We have not identified any adjustments affecting the Fund's reported financial position. However, we have agreed with officers some minor adjustments to improve the presentation of the financial statements.

Further details are set out in section two of this report.

Controls

Roles and responsibilities

The Council's management is responsible for the identification, assessment, management and monitoring of risk, and for developing, operating and monitoring the system of internal control.

Our audit is not designed to test all internal controls or identify all areas of control weakness. However, where, as part of our testing, we identify any control weaknesses, we report these to the Council as the administering authority.

Findings

Our work has not identified any control weaknesses which we wish to highlight for your attention.

Further details are provided within section two of this report.

The way forward

Matters arising from the financial statements audit have been discussed with the County Treasurer and the finance team.

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04.	Communication of audit matters

Audit findings

In this section we present our findings in respect of matters and risks identified at the planning stage of the audit and additional matters that arose during the course of our work. We set out on the following pages the work we have performed and the findings arising from our work in respect of the audit risks we identified in our audit plan, presented to the Audit Committee on 27 March 2015. We also set out the adjustments to the financial statements arising from our audit work and our findings in respect of internal controls.

Changes to Audit Plan

In the conduct of our audit we have made only one change our planned audit approach, which we communicated to you in our Audit Plan dated 27 March 2015. This was to re-classify the audit of the valuation of level 3 investments as a significant risk. We communicated this tot he Treasurer in our updated plan dated 27th July 2015.

Audit opinion

We provide two opinions on the Pension Fund, as follows:

- an audit opinion on the Pension Fund financial statements included in the Council's Statement of Accounts
- an opinion on the Pension Fund financial statements included in the Pension Fund Annual Report, which confirms if these financial statements are consistent with the financial statements in the Statement of Accounts

Our proposed audit opinion on the Pension Fund financial statements in the Statement of Accounts is set out in Appendix B.

We have recently received a final copy of the Fund's Annual Report. We will confirm

the wording of our proposed opinion on the financial statements in the Annual Report on completion of our review of the Annual Report.

Audit findings against significant risks

"Significant risks often relate to significant non-routine transactions and judgmental matters. Non-routine transactions are transactions that are unusual, either due to size or nature, and that therefore occur infrequently. Judgmental matters may include the development of accounting estimates for which there is significant measurement uncertainty" (ISA (UK&I) 315).

In this section we detail our response to the significant risks of material misstatement which we identified in the Audit Plan. As we noted in our plan, there are two presumed significant risks which are applicable to all audits under auditing standards.

For the two Level 3 Investments, we tested valuations by obtaining and reviewing audited accounts at the latest date for individual investments and agreeing these to the fund manager reports at that date. We reconciled those values to the values at 31st March 2015 with reference to known movements in the intervening period. The existence of investments were confirmed directly with independent custodians. We reviewed the nature and basis of estimated values and considered what assurance management has over the year end valuations provided for these types of investments. 	Our audit work has not identified any significant issues in relation to the risks identified.

1.	Matters in relation to fraud	We have previously discussed the risk of fraud with the Audit Committee and been made aware of any reporting. We have not been made aware of any other incidents in the period and no other issues have been identified during the course of our audit.
2.	Matters in relation to laws and regulations	We are not aware of any significant incidences of non-compliance with relevant laws and regulations.
3.	Written representations	A letter of representation has been requested from the Fund
4.	Disclosures	Our review found no material omissions in the financial statements.
5.	Matters in relation to related parties	We are not aware of any related party transactions which have not been disclosed

Confirmation requests from third parties	 We obtained direct confirmations from Aviva, Aberdeen Asset Management, State Street, UBS and Lazard for investment balances and requested from management permission to send confirmation requests to Barclays for bank and investment balances. This permission was granted and the requests were sent. All of these requests were returned with positive confirmation.
7.	Going concern	Our work has not identified any reason to challenge the Fund's decision to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

Internal controls

The purpose of an audit is to express an opinion on the financial statements.

Our audit included consideration of internal controls relevant to the preparation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control. We considered and walked through the internal controls for **investments, member data, benefits and contributions** as set out on page 10, 11 and 12 above.

The controls were found to be operating effectively and we have no matters to report to the Audit Committee.

If a death occurs close to the beginning or end of the year then the liability in Altair could be recorded in a different year from the ledger.	The Council regularly reconciles Altair to the ledger DCDL – with particular focus on transactions close to year end. This year our testing identified another difference between the Altair system and the ledger. Subsequent enquires showed that the difference had been previously identified by the administration team but not corrected. We are satisfied this is not a reconciliation issue but it would be better to correct errors when they are identified.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF DEVON COUNTY COUNCIL

We have audited the pension fund financial statements of Devon County Council for the year ended 31 March 2015 under the Audit Commission Act 1998. The pension fund financial statements comprise the Pension Fund Account, the Net Assets Statement and the related notes. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and the CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2014/15.

This report is made solely to the members of Devon County Council in accordance with Part II of the Audit Commission Act 1998, as set out in paragraph 48 of the Statement of Responsibilities of Auditors and Audited Bodies published by the Audit Commission in March 2010 and for no other purpose.
