* 1 <u>Election of Chairman</u>

RESOLVED that Councillor Croad be elected Chairman for the ensuing year.

* 2 <u>Election of Vice Chairman</u>

RESOLVED that Councillor Hawkins be elected Vice Chairman for the ensuing year.

* 3 Minutes

RESOLVED that the minutes of the meeting held on 24 March 2017 be approved as a true record.

* 4 Items Requiring Urgent Attention

There were no items requiring urgent attention.

* 5 <u>Member Induction - Duties and Responsibilities and Traffic Regulation Order</u> (TRO) Approval Process

The Committee received a presentation from the Acting Chief Officer for Highways, Infrastructure Development and Waste on the work of the Committee covering the Constitution, Terms of Reference and Scheme of Delegation.

Members asked for clarification on the timeline and process for capital allocations being included within the final programme of works.

RESOLVED that officers prepare a briefing note on the timings and process and that Members receive an update at the next meeting of the HATOC.

* 6 Devon Highways Term Maintenance Contract

(Mr S Cane (Skanska) attended and spoke to this item at the invitation of the Committee).

The Committee received a presentation from Mr S Cane (Contract Manager) Skanska UK covering:

- the Company's origin and ethos, number of employees worldwide and UK and wide ranging infrastructure and engineering activities across local authority and other sectors;
- management of the Devon Highways Maintenance Contract, including 9 operational Depots (including transfer of a depot to an alternative site from Gas Lane, Torrington), co-location of staff within Lucombe house at County Hall, use of the existing 'Devon Highways' brand, investment in new operational vehicles, a new training academy, information sharing and development of 'system thinking' to achieve efficiencies and cashable savings;
- the Company's safety culture and sustainable/energy policies and working practices, behavioural code of practice for employees in relations with contract partners and the public; and
- the Company's training ethos, career development of employees, including apprenticeships.

Members' questions and comments related, inter alia, to responsibility for directional signage, the role of Parish Lengthsman, any links of Skanska with the Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP), rail investment, clarification of the digital information processes and whether this would allow Parish Councils to be notified of forthcoming works, promotion of the road warden scheme and also how quality issues would be monitored and improved upon.

* 7 Marldon Site Visit Feedback - 20mph and Zebra Crossing Request

(Mr Clements, Headteacher of Marldon Primary School, attended and in the spirit of the Public Participation Rules spoke at the invitation of the Committee).

(Mrs Sutton, Representative of Marldon Speed Reduction Group attended and in the spirit of the Public Participation Rules spoke at the invitation of the Committee).

Members discussed the issues arising from the site visit earlier in the day which included traffic and speeding through the village and also potential solutions and / or sites for a crossing in the vicinity of Marldon School.

(a) Zebra Crossing

In relation to the consideration of a zebra crossing in the vicinity of Marldon Primary School, Members heard evidence from officers about the national criteria for installations of zebra crossings, which were not met in this case, and the potential for other options including an island or a raised crossing and a potential location between Millmans Road and the school.

Members raised concerns over rights of ways, speeding near to the school, whether the school had investigated the option of lollypop crossing patrols and also that there was no funding currently identified for any scheme.

It was MOVED by Councillor Pennington, and SECONDED by Hawkins, and

RESOLVED that the Committee supports the principle of a zebra crossing in the suggested location between Millmans Road and the School and asks officers to work on suitable proposals and a way forward in terms of safety audits, the necessary usage statistics when funding had been identified.

(b) 20 MPH speed limit in Marldon

The second issue arising from the site visit related to consideration of a 20mph speed restriction through Marldon and Compton.

Members were reminded that the Committees previous resolution of supporting a blanket 20mph speed limit zone in Marldon and Compton had been to Cabinet as an exemption / departure from policy. Cabinet had resolved to not approve the request to

depart from Council Policy but following the receipt of Governments' advice on 20mph speed limits, a review of the County Council's policy on local speed limits would be undertaken.

Members again expressed their disappointment at the continued delay for this study.

In discussion, Members raised the issues of the work of Mr Hamilton Baillie, including opportunities for looking at more innovative solutions for reconciling traffic movement with quality public spaces in towns and villages and also the options for extension of the existing 20mph zone with other traffic calming measures.

It was MOVED by Councillor Gilbert, and SECONDED by Hawkins, and

RESOLVED

- (a) that Officers be asked to meet with Parish Council representatives to consider a scheme or schemes that would allow the extension of existing 20mph zone, notwithstanding the request for a Zebra Crossing that might form part of these proposals; and
- (b) that Members express their disquiet at the continued delays of the Government's review of 20mph speed limits and asks that Cabinet write, again, to the Department for Transport on this matter.

* 8 Progress on Re-Opening of Beacon Road, Kingswear

(Annie Lovell, Dart Area Landscape Access Group and Lynne Maurer, Representative of Kingswear Parish Council attended and in the spirit of the Public Participation Rules spoke at the invitation of the Committee).

The Committee noted that, in accordance with Standing Order 23, Councillor Hawkins had asked that the Committee consider the progress on the re-opening of Beacon Road, Kingswear.

The Committee received a verbal report from the Acting Chief Officer for Highways, Infrastructure Development and Waste which updated Members on the cliff landslide which had occurred in December 2012 and the ongoing discussions with landowners to stabilise the cliff and also reinstate the footpath.

It was noted that whilst a section 143 notice had been issued in relation to the relocation of timber barriers, works were still required to stablise the cliff and make the footway safe.

Members asked questions in relation to ownership of the cliff and potential legal options to progress the re-opening of Beacon Road.

It was MOVED by Councillor Brazil, SECONDED by Councillor Hawkins, and

RESOLVED that this Committee expresses its disappointment of the continued delays in reopening Beacon Road and asks officers to prepare a report outlining the issues to date and of options that would enable the road to be re-opened, including taking a more robust approach to the consideration of legal action.

* 9 <u>Annual Waiting Restriction Programme</u>

Members considered the Report of the Acting Chief Officer for Highways, Infrastructure Development and Waste (HIW/17/60) on annual waiting restrictions programme process for 2017/2018.

Due to previous difficulties in delivering requests for waiting restrictions (resource and / or funding pressures), the Council introduced an annual Local Waiting Restriction Programme for each HATOC area for funding and delivering waiting restriction schemes. The 2016/17 programme delivered proposals at over 250 sites across Devon and building on that success it was intended to develop a programme for 2017/18 to include minor aids to movement improvements such as drop crossing, footway improvements and bollards.

The report outlined that Cabinet had allocated £100,000 countywide, equated to £12,500 to each HATOC area and approval was being sought for the 2017/18 programme

Appendix I (waiting restriction proposals) and appendix II (aids to movement proposals) of the report identified the proposed schemes and outlined the need for consultation on the detail with the local Member and Chairman of the HATOC, before the proposals would be designed and any associated Traffic Order drafted and advertised.

Members noted that proposals with no objections would be implemented, those with minor objections would be determined under delegated powers by the acting Chief Officer in consultation with the Local Member and the Chair of HATOC and those attracting significant objections would be reported to a future HATOC meeting.

In discussion Members were informed that there was scope to add additional schemes, but that the detail of these needed to be 'worked up' before the end of August 2017.

It was MOVED by Councillor Hawkins, and SECONDED by Councillor Brazil, and

RESOLVED

- (a) that work on the annual waiting restrictions programme process for 2017/2018 be noted;
- (b) that the recommendations contained in Appendix I to this report be endorsed and subject to consultation with local Members on the details, the proposals be advertised; and
- (c) that the recommendations contained in Appendix II to this report be agreed and subject to consultation with local Members on those details, the proposals be implemented.

* 10 Links Court Service Road, Thurlestone: Stopping-up of Highway

Members considered the Report of the Acting Chief Officer for Highways, Infrastructure Development and Waste (HIW/17/61) on the stopping up of the Highway in Links Court Service Road, Thurlestone.

The report outlined that following storms in 2014, a section of the Links Court Service Road was washed away and became beyond repair and the remaining length of road only served the Thurlestone Golf Club.

In November, the HATOC approved the principal of stopping up this public highway, however further consultations required a slight modification. It was proposed that an application be made to the Magistrates' Court (S116 of the Highways Act 1980) for the stopping-up of part of the public highway in Links Service Road, Thurlestone, shown at Appendix I and drawing HCDW/PROW/14/095.6 to the report. The proposal included retaining bridleway rights in the area and creating public footpaths from A-B and C-D-E-F.

Members noted that a number of organisations had been contacted and the consultation responses were listed in Appendix II of the report.

In discussion Members clarified that the cycling tourist club were now in agreement with the proposals.

RESOLVED

- (a) that the Committee re-confirm its view that the part of the public highway in Links Court Service Road, Thurlestone as shown on the drawing (attached as Appendix I) is unnecessary for public use;
- (b) that the Committee supports Devon County Council to make an application to the magistrates' court for an order under Section 116 of the Highways Act 1980 that the part of the said highway be stopped up; and
- (c) that the Committee reconfirms it has no objection to the proposed amendments to the public rights of way network.

* 11 Exeter Road (B3372) South Brent - Various Traffic Calming Measures

Following consideration of this matter at the last meeting, Councillor Smerdon reported on the requirements of the Parish Council for Exeter Road in South Brent.

Discussions had taken place with officers and a recent Speed Compliance Action Review Forum had agreed locations for flashing vehicle activated signs at each end of the problematic area, which would be progressed and funded by the parish council.

Councillor Smerdon also highlighted that a future development in the area might raise the need for a crossing.

* 12 Petitions/Parking Policy Reviews

There was no petition from a member of the public or the Council relating to the South Hams.

* 13 Dates for Future HATOC Meetings

Annual Local Waiting Restriction Programme

Report of the Chief Officer for Highways, Infrastructure Development and Waste

Please note that the following recommendations are subject to consideration and determination by the Committee before taking effect.

Recommendation: It is recommended that:

- (a) work on the annual waiting restrictions programme process for 2017/2018 is noted;
- (b) the recommendations contained in Appendix III to this report are agreed and the proposals implemented where relevant; and
- (c) the proposals detailed in Appendix I which attracted no objections are implemented as advertised.

1. Background

The County Council regularly receives requests for waiting restrictions to be introduced or amended. These can be difficult to deliver due to resource and funding pressures which can then have a negative impact on the County Council's relationship with local communities.

Recognising this difficulty, a managed process has been developed to deliver an Annual Local Waiting Restriction Programme for each HATOC area for the funding and delivery of waiting restriction schemes.

The 2016/17 programme delivered proposals at over 250 sites across Devon. These were mainly amendments to yellow lines and limited waiting, thought to be non-controversial, which had been requested by communities or by local Highway Officers.

Building on the success of this process, the 2017/18 programme is currently progressing in the region of 500 proposals along with a small programme of minor aids to movement improvements such as dropped crossings, footway improvements and bollards.

2. Proposal

Cabinet has allocated an amount of £100,000 countywide from the On-Street Parking Account to this process in 2017/18 which equates to an amount of £12,500 to each HATOC area.

Following the meeting of this Committee on 7 July 2017 and subsequent liaison with Local Members, a number of proposals were advertised in the local press and on site.

Advertised Proposals are listed in Appendix I with Plans of the proposals shown in Appendix II and comments received and recommendations shown in Appendix III.

3. Specific Aids to Movement Proposals

A number of Aids to Movement Proposals are currently being progressed as part of this project as shown on the plans in Appendix IV. These include:

- South Town, Dartmouth installation of bollards outside number 24 to prevent damage to the building
- Victoria Road, Dartmouth addition of five bollards outside the Post Office to prevent pavement parking which obstructs the footway

4. Financial Considerations

The total costs of the scheme are contained within a countywide budget of £100,000 which has been allocated from the On-Street Parking Account.

There will be a cost to the Council in advertising a new Traffic Order for each Committee Area, this will be approximately £1,500. In addition, the costs of any changes to signing or lining will be attributed to that Order.

5. Environmental Impact Considerations

The proposals are intended to rationalise on street parking and improve mobility and access within the district and are designed to:

- Encourage turnover of on street parking to benefit residents and businesses.
- Enable enforcement to be undertaken efficiently.
- Encourage longer term visitors to use off street car parks.
- Encourage commuters to make more sustainable travel choices eg Car Share, Public Transport, Walking and Cycling.
- Assist pedestrians and other vulnerable road users in crossing the highway

The Environmental effects of the scheme are therefore positive.

6. Equality Considerations

There are not considered to be any equality issues associated with the proposals. The impact will therefore be neutral.

7. Legal Considerations

The lawful implications and consequences of the proposal have been considered and taken into account in the preparation of this report.

When making a Traffic Regulation Order it is the County Council's responsibility to ensure that all relevant legislation is complied with. This includes Section 122 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 that states that it is the duty of a local authority, so far as practicable, secures the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of traffic and provision of parking facilities. It is considered that the proposals comply with Section 122 of the Act as they practically secure the safe and expeditious movement of traffic in the South Hams District.

8. Risk Management Considerations

There are thought to be no major safety issues arising from the proposals.

9. Public Health Impact

There is not considered to be any public health impact.

10. Reasons for Recommendations

The proposals rationalise existing parking arrangements within the South Hams District by:

- Encouraging turnover of on street parking to benefit residents and businesses
- Enabling enforcement to be undertaken efficiently.
- Encouraging longer term visitors to use off street car parks.
- Encouraging those working in the town make more sustainable travel choices eg Car Share, Public Transport, Walking and Cycling.

The proposals contribute to the safe and expeditious movement of traffic in the South Hams District and therefore comply with S 122 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984.

Traffic Sensitive Streets Review 2017

Report of the Acting Chief Officer for Highways, Infrastructure Development and Waste

Please note that the following recommendation is subject to consideration and determination by the Committee before taking effect.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Committee notes that Devon County Council propose to undertake a full review of the traffic sensitive streets network across the county. Proposed completion: 1 April 2018.

1. Background/Introduction

Devon County Council has a legal duty under the Traffic Management Act 2004/Section 59 New Roads and Street Works Act 1991 to Co-ordinate works activities on the road network.

As part of this duty, a power is afforded to Devon County Council to enable the designation of certain streets as 'Traffic Sensitive'.

When a street is designated 'Traffic Sensitive', timings of works can be better regulated to ensure free flow of traffic so far as reasonably practicable. i.e. no works on Topsham Road, Exeter during peak morning and afternoon traffic flows.

The project works in line with Devon County Council's strategic objective in the Better Together vision, getting from A to B.

The last recorded full review was undertaken in 1994. Designations in some cases are currently no longer fit for purpose and effectiveness is reduced.

Main aims/Objective of project:

- ✓ To ensure all possible effects of works are raised at an early stage in the planning process and considered, managed and communicated affectively.
- ✓ To co-ordinate works and reduce impact on road users.
- ✓ Ensure safe and easy passage for road users on Devon's network.
- ✓ To meet statutory duties imposed under the network management duty.
- ✓ To help manage the balance of works in line with other events on the public highway. i.e. local and special events.
- ✓ To ensure the effects of all works on the road network are minimised for the local economy.
- ✓ To improve open communication and better planning between works promoters and Devon County Council. N.B. This project is not aimed at prohibiting or limiting options for works to be undertaken.

How will the review be undertaken?

Statutory Regulations outline when a street can be designated traffic sensitive. The following steps must be completed before a designation can be updated:

- Each street is crossed referenced against the statutory triggers.
- Proposals for revised designations are outlined.
- Communications are undertaken with affected stakeholders.
- A 1 month statutory consultation is undertaken.
- Updating of Devon's mapping data is completed.

What are the Impacts?

It is envisaged that some designations will be increased due to traffic flow levels. Some may be removed. The proposal aims to consider strategic visions for network growth wherever possible.

Works promoters may find adjusted restrictions on working practices/timescales (N.B. this includes Devon County Council's contractors). However, the overall objective is to trigger early communication and better planning. It is not to prevent works taking place.

3. Options/Alternatives

The process is determined by statute, therefore there is no alternative.

4. Consultations/Representations/Technical Data

Statutory consultation proposed for March/April 2018.

5. Financial Considerations

The costs involved are resource costs for in-situ Highway Officers only as outlined by the project plan.

6. Environmental Impact Considerations

No areas have been identified.

7. Equality Considerations

No areas have been identified. Project is operating to standard designation tolerances and will be implemented consistently across the county.

8. Legal Considerations

The lawful implications/consequences of the proposals have been considered and taken into account in the preparation of this report.

9. Risk Management Considerations

No risks have been identified.

10. Public Health Impact

No areas have been identified.

11. Reasons for Recommendations

This report has been compiled at the initial stages of the project to enable a clear and open communication process between Devon County Council and its members.

Review of Yealmpton Crossing

Report of the Chief Officer Highways, Infrastructure Development and Waste

Please note that the following recommendation is subject to consideration and determination by the Committee before taking effect.

Recommendation: It is recommended that a review of the options for installing a crossing facility of the A379 at Underhay, Yealmpton be undertaken, with a view to identifying funding for implementation, if an acceptable site can be identified.

1. Summary

A zebra crossing was advertised at Underhay on the A379 at Yealmpton in July 2014 but, following a number of objections, the proposal was not progressed. The original developer funding is no longer available.

2. Background/Introduction

A planning condition on the construction of 100 houses at Kitley Place on Milizac lose in Yealmpton required the developer, Taylor Wimpey, to install an unspecified type of crossing point at Underhay on the A379. The crossing aimed to connect Yealmpton Primary School on the south side of the A379 with residential development on the north side of the A379.

The close proximity of bus bays and side road junctions made it difficult to find a suitable site for a crossing position. Concerns were also raised about the speed of traffic on the A379. Four options for a zebra crossing were considered in detail between 2012 and 2014, none of which satisfied the criteria for the installation of a zebra crossing in terms of pedestrian and traffic flows. One of these options was advertised for implementation in July 2014, with a proposed construction start in September 2014.

The advertised crossing point, as shown in appendix A, was to be located approximately 50m to the west of the junction with Bowden Hill. Following advertisement, a number of objections were received and a decision was made not to progress with the proposal. As none of the other options was considered safe to implement the obligation to the developer was discharged.

Following a representation from Yealmpton Parish Council, supported by the Head Teacher and Parents Forum at Yealmpton Primary School, on 13 March 2017, Members have asked for the situation to be reviewed, in order to determine whether a crossing could now be installed.

3. Financial Considerations

The original design options were completed in 2014 and would need to be reviewed.

As the developer's obligation has now been discharged there is currently no funding in place to undertake the design or implementation works and funding would have to be found from other budgets.

4. Environmental Impact Considerations

A crossing point would help the school to promote walking to school amongst its pupils, reducing emissions from motorised transport.

5. Equality Considerations

No new policies are being recommended in this report and therefore an individual Equality Impact and Needs Assessment for the scheme is not considered necessary.

6. Legal Considerations

When making a Traffic Regulation Order it is the County Council responsibility to ensure that all relevant legislation is complied with. This includes Section 122 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 that states that it is the duty of a local authority, so far as practicable, secures the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of traffic and provision of parking facilities.

7. Risk Management Considerations

There are no risk management considerations.

8. Public Health Impact

As walking to school is considered to be healthier than using motorised transport there would be a small public health benefit if the zebra crossing were to be installed.

9. Options/Alternatives

There is currently no crossing point in place.

10. Reason for Recommendations

In light of representations from the Parish Council and Primary School Devon County Council has been asked to review the previous proposals to determine whether a suitable site can be found, and funding identified, for the installation of a zebra crossing at this site.



Briefing Note on Development of the Transport Capital Programme: July 2017

The transport capital programme is generally agreed by Cabinet on an annual basis although a two year programme is agreed where practical and feasible. Cabinet approval can be at any time between the autumn and February depending on the need to update the programme or Cabinet workloads. Variations may be made to the capital programme throughout the year via the FIN letter process if additional funds are secured, for example through a successful bid.

The capital programme for transport is made up from a large variety of internal and external funding sources, some of which come with specific timescale, geographic, match funding and other specific conditions. These have to be carefully managed to meet the conditions they come with which may mean varying allocations within agreed delegated limits to meet changing circumstances.

Core Integrated Block Funding

The only certain core funding is the Integrated Block (IB) allocation from DfT. This is currently approx. £3.6m per annum but may vary in future years as DfT adjusts it in response to various factors. The level has reduced from around £10m per annum back in 2010. The Council's strategy is to maximise the leverage value of this funding to secure as much external funding as possible, particularly competitive funds awarded by the Government but also more localised ones such as District Council contributions. This means that IB may be used to prepare scheme designs for future funding bids or provide match funding where this is required.

Strategic Policy Framework

The Local Transport Plan sets out the strategic growth areas where investment will be particularly focussed. These include Exeter, Newton Abbot, Barnstaple / Bideford, Sherford and Tiverton. These are areas where the investment is aimed at accelerating and encouraging new housing and employment growth and where much of central government (and LEP) funding is focussed. The strategic growth areas are also likely to generate significant match funding for external bids from sources such as Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) and Section 106 agreements.

The Walking and Cycling and Multi-use Trail strategy sets out the priorities for the longer strategic routes in rural areas and which will guide priorities for investment and securing external funding. Similarly the Transport Investment Plan sets out the anticipated programme of key schemes across the County. Both of these documents have been approved by Cabinet.

Other Issues

The above does not mean that areas outside the growth locations will not receive IB or have potential to secure external funding sources. There are a number of ongoing countywide programmes including walking and cycling improvements focussed on access within market towns and improving access to schools / employment along with bus real time information provision. Developer funding will still be important in a number of locations subject to viability and other infrastructure requirements such as education, open space and affordable housing. It may be possible to use this as match for external funding in some circumstances where a suitable source exists.



The On-street Car Parking account also provides funding for a number of schemes across the county including TRO priorities agreed by HATOCs – the programme for this is normally agreed around February / March each year. Other County Council sourced funds such as Invest in Devon and corporate funding have generally been allocated or exhausted with few or no additional allocations expected.

The geographic spread of capital spending may vary considerably year by year and it is therefore important not to just focus on one year's allocation.

Developer contributions are frequently secured through S106 or CIL. Actual cash receipts may however be sometime in the future and are often linked to the actual occupation of houses or premises (this may be 5-10 years from the signing of an agreement in some cases). The County Council can, in limited circumstances, 'forward fund' works reliant on these sources until the funds are received and has indeed done so in a number of cases around the county. This mechanism is particularly used to match fund external funding bids or to prepare a design for a future bid. The County Council is however close to the limit where it can forward fund significant new schemes so this mechanism will have to be applied very carefully and sparingly. There may also be a risk in some cases that developments may not proceed at all, seek to renegotiate a previous agreement or reduce the development's size or type. It cannot therefore be assumed that developer contributions can be spent as soon as an agreement is in place.
